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A NOTE FROM THE PLAYWRIGHT

The play began its journey to today in 1992. I was riding on a train from New York City to Providence, Rhode Island where I was studying playwriting with Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright, Paula Vogel at Brown University. I picked up an abandoned New York Times newspaper on the seat beside me. On the front page in the lower right-hand corner was a small image of a Black baseball player with a price tag hanging around his body. I looked around the train car to see if anyone else felt the same rage I felt, reading at least three racially biased articles in the newspaper that day. In response to my anger, I began to write Square Blues from the point of view of a character who had a visceral response to being assaulted everyday by images and actions that constantly denied his humanity, his cultural heritage, and his manhood, and so takes action. But as with all plays, ideas grew and changed as the play took shape after that initial spark.

With Square Blues today, I am looking at the very different strategies of three generations in a family confronting racism, oppression, injustice, and how they each stand up for their beliefs. Dream sharing, theatrical provocative protests, a wall mural created during the course of the play, original songs, interracial, intergenerational, racism, classism, sexism, homophobia and redefining what makes a family are all ingredients that made this my most experimental play at that time. With its look at reparations for Black, Brown, and Indigenous people, it may also now be my most topical play. But I also wanted to show sensuality between these Black characters and how they dealt with the reality of their lives with a sense of humor and grace.

The first version of the play was scheduled for a full production in a season of Black Women Playwrights at Penumbra Theatre in Minneapolis, MN in 1993. But It was no secret that in the early and mid-nineties there was a very conservative political atmosphere in the worlds of art and theater tied to funding, and there still is to a degree. Square Blues and most of the other plays in what would have been a radical and groundbreaking season were cancelled. The producer was afraid of losing government funding and a significant portion of the theater's subscriber base that might find the themes in the play too provocative for audiences at that time. Back then, they were not ready.

In 1995, Anna Deveare Smith selected *Square Blues* for the Paul Green Playwriting Award. As an honoree for the 21st Century Playwrights Award, **Edward Albee, one of the judges said of** *Square Blues***: "...it has a virtue of gut, urgency and necessity which make it stand out for me. There is an unadorned honesty to it; nothing is clever in it; the writer vanishes and we are left with the work itself." I was encouraged, even when Edward Albee suggested I diversify my creative output by writing novels, essays and explore other art forms and genres to sustain myself as an artist. I have taken his advice and have added performance art, painting and writing children's plays and books to my portfolio.**

But I love the communal nature of theater and when I see a play that moves me to action, or an actor who makes me say "amen" out loud, I feel the need to write plays again. I now find that there is an urgency for me to get the ideas that are in this work into the current conversation. I offer up a script and work in community with a group of folks who bring their skills to a production that I hope will move people to action. I have been truly blessed to work with such a gifted director, cast, crew, design team, tech folks, stage managers and producers to bring my characters and ideas to life.

I hope Square Blues will inspire many cross generational conversations. I want audience members who can do so to vote and for everyone to tell someone in their life that they are loved and appreciated. I'm thrilled that this world premiere of Square Blues is finally seeing the light of day in these times. The love and the revolution continues!

FROM THE CO-ARTISTIC/PRODUCING DIRECTOR

Horizon has a long history of collaboration with Shay Youngblood, having produced the World Premiere of her first play, Shakin' the Mess Outta Misery, in 1988. She came to me with the script typed on onion skin paper, an adaptation of her Big Mama stories. She was what all successful people are—persistent! It went onto many productions across the country and was reprised at Horizon in 2010 (directed by Square Blues director Tom Jones and winning the Suzi Award for Outstanding Production of a Play). Horizon also produced her Talking Bones and Amazing Grace, and workshopped many of her plays, including Square Blues.

When Shay moved back to Atlanta last year, we connected and invited her to join the Black Women Speak project for which she is now working on a new play commission. She then shared with me that she had gone back to work on Square Blues, which Horizon had workshopped years before. She had written it in the mid-nineties, and at the time, it was receiving workshops at multiple theatres across the country. Anna Deveare Smith selected it for the Paul Green Playwriting Award. Edward Albee chose it for the 21st Century Playwrights Award. Everyone loved it, including me, but it was controversial with AIDS activism and black reparations as main topics and lesbian sex on stage—it was ahead of its time. Despite many workshops. it was never produced.

With the great racial reckoning over the past two years, *Square Blues* is suddenly current and urgent. Shay went back to the play, kept it set as a period piece in the 1990s, but adjusted it through today's lens, writing new scenes and honing it with her perspective as a more seasoned artist.

The play is set in matriarch Odessa Blue's neighborhood café where three generations of a Black southern family share a passion for activism, art and following your heart. Odessa's cause was her interracial marriage and civil rights, Karma is an AIDS activist in the era of ACT UP, and her father, Square Blue, is invested in Black reparations. But they don't always agree on each other's methods of protests, especially when it threatens their freedom and safety. In this expansive, timely and magical comedy-drama, the Blue family faces a crossroads. Only united can they find the courage to stand up for their beliefs as they redefine what makes a family and what holds it together.

I always loved Square Blues. Its vivid, passionate characters, the magic realism, the musicality of the language, the high theatricality of performance art protests on stage and creating a mural of famous Black leaders every night, the deep love between grandmother, father and daughter, and how different generations approach the call for change. But I was one of those who thought audiences weren't ready. In reading Shay's new draft this past fall, I was thrilled to see the impactful changes she had made, and how she was able to bring the craft she had learned as a writer over the last two decades to revise this deep, funny, and moving work.

We are excited to be premiering Shay's play about activists from three generations at this time of upheaval and change in our world. The play looks at how activism changes as we age and the need for each generation's work and perspective. What can we learn from the past? What needs to change to make progress? What is the future of activism? How can different generations work together to make progress? We hope that the play sparks discussion about how we can work together across generational divides to find common ground that unites and amplifies our effort for change. —Lisa Adler

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ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

SHAY YOUNGBLOOD is an Atlanta-based writer, visual artist, and educator, as well as the playwright of Horizon's award-winning hit Shakin' the Mess Outta Misery. her first play. which premiered at Horizon in 1988 and 1989. Horizon reprised it in 2010, and the production won the Suzi Award for Outstanding Production of a Play, also directed by Tom Jones. A fiction writer who turned her Big Mama Stories into Shakin', she subsequently received her MFA in playwriting from Brown under Paula Vogel. She is the author of several novels including Black Girl in Paris and Soul Kiss, collections of short stories and numerous essays. Her published plays including Shakin' the Mess Out of Misery, Talking Bones and Amazing Grace (a stage adaptation of a children's book), all produced by Horizon, have been widely-produced. Her short stories have been performed at Symphony Space and recorded for NPR's Selected Shorts. Mama's Home and Family Prayer, illustrated children's books, are forthcoming from Random House.

Honors include a Pushcart Prize for fiction, NAACP award for her plays, and a fellowship from the New York Foundation for the Arts. Shay is currently one of Horizon's Black Women Speak writers, writing a new commissioned play about Black Southern women. Boss Ladies and Tender-Hearted Girls. Other current projects include Tent Cities, an environmental fable, and an interdisciplinary performance work about architecture, memory and the environment inspired by research in Japan, China and the U.S. Youngblood was appointed as a Commissioner to the Japan U.S. Friendship Commission in 2021, serves on the board of Yaddo artist residency, and teaches graduate creative writing workshops at City College, NY. Though she has now lived all over the world, she was born and raised in Columbus, GA, went to Clark College (now Clark Atlanta University), and recently returned to live in Atlanta, GA.
